Since December, the English Teaching Team has been hard at work creating unimagined futures for all of our students at Stone Soup Academy.

We have seen some outstanding progress when it comes to Functional Skills qualifications within Year 11. Every single Year 11 student should be proud of what they have achieved so far and should be putting in their best effort as we enter the final stretch of the year.

Continuing on from the successes of last year, we are once again aiming to ensure that all of our Year 11 students leave with a Speaking and Listening qualification. They will then be able to use this experience and qualification when approaching prospective colleges and future employers.

Our Year 10 students have also started learning the GCSE English Literature and Language content. All students in Year 10 have been studying A Christmas Carol, a key GCSE text that covers topics such as charity, social inequality, and social responsibility. Our blended approach to the curriculum means that all students will experience some GCSE English Literature content which will help them make an informed decision should they choose to carry on studying the subject in Year 11.

Our KS3 students have also been studying a wider range of literature too covering stories through time in Stepping Stones and short stories in Year 9. We are also making progress using the online reading platform Accelerated Reader for targeted reading

intervention and reading assessment. We hope to enhance the use of this online platform even further when we move over to Milbie House and are excited to explore how our new immersion room can be used to support reading engagement. We have also recently invested in a variety of different text types that will populate the new library space at Milbie House.

Staff and students across the Academy also celebrated World Book Day 2023 on 7th March. As well as dressing up as well known book characters, staff shared their favourite novels and encouraged all students to share their reading interests throughout the day. Students even took part in a literature scavenger hunt during their English lessons. All staff made a fantastic effort sharing their memorable moments and characters from literature.

A special mention is deserved for Kaden and Jake who worked excellently together, bouncing ideas from one another, and demonstrating their mathematical ability.

Year 9: Knowing Media Fundamentals

Year 9 students have delved into the foundations of media, learning the essential keywords and their definitions. This groundwork aims to bolster their comprehension, should they choose to pursue CDMP for their BTEC.

Previously, their journey has included immersive experiences with augmented reality (AR) and virtual reality (VR) using Oculus technology. Next on the agenda is crafting personalised animated avatars and creating assets. They'll use these skills tointegrate avatars and environments into software for video game development, such as Unity, Unreal Engine 5 or Buildbox.

Year 10: Moving Image (Unit 3)

In the realm of Year 10, the focus has been on the captivating world of moving images. After thorough discussions on key terminology, students were tasked with demonstrating their understanding through interactive quizzes. Impressively, both classes achieved an average recognition rate of 80%. Simultaneously, they're perfecting their skills in setting up standard lighting configurations using

three lights (key, fill, and back). This is a crosstopic that the media subject has in common with photography. This is essential for creating diverse lighting effects in video production as per movie industry's standards. Their ultimate objective is to craft a 30-second advertisement, analysing formats, platforms, and target audiences.

Year 11: Portfolio Development and Exam Preparation (Unit 1)

For Year 11 students, they have been dedicated to crafting comprehensive portfolios. These portfolios serve as a narrative, documenting their ideation, pre-production, production, and post-production processes for their media projects, be it moving images or video games. This portfolio is a testament to their creativity and individuality. Following this phase, they'll dive into the analysis of Unit 1, gearing up for their exams by utilising past papers. Additionally, they'll be tasked with articulating their understanding of every facet of the unit, ensuring they're thoroughly prepared for the upcoming assessments.



Preparation for Adulthood

Work Experience at Welbeck Primary:

One of our Year 11 students Angel who expressed an interest in childcare during her Careers guidance meeting had the opportunity to do work experience at The Welbeck Primary School. Angel's time at Welbeck Primary was met with glowing commendations from the school staff. The Head teacher expressed regret at not having the chance to speak with Angel before her departure. Positive reports circulated about Angel's interactions with the children and her helpful contributions in the classroom. The school was genuinely pleased to support Angel's placement and her transition into the professional world.

"It was so lovely to host Angel, I didn't get a chance to catch her before she left. I heard lots of good things about her manner with the children and how helpful she was in class. We were really happy to support this placement and her journey to a world of work."

HMRC Work Experience:

Work experience was conducted at Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs (HMRC). The program encompassed a range of activities designed to expose students to various facets of HMRC's operations.

Mock Court Cases:

During the work experience, students engaged in simulated court cases related to tax matters. This exercise proved to be instrumental in fostering an understanding of the legal aspects underpinning HMRC's role. Participants were tasked with navigating hypothetical scenarios, thereby gaining insights into the complexities of tax regulations and legal procedures.

Industry Expert Sessions:

An integral component of the program involved sessions with industry experts. These professionals shared their expertise on current developments within the tax landscape, offering valuable perspectives on the challenges and opportunities facing HMRC. These interactions provided participants with a broader understanding of industry trends and regulatory changes.

Presentation on a New Tax Concept:

The students have now been tasked with preparing a presentation on a novel tax concept. This exercise required them to research, analyse, and articulate their findings. The objective was to cultivate critical thinking skills and enhance the ability to communicate complex tax concepts. The presentations, delivered to a group audience of HMRC Bosses will take place in June.

Work experience at HMRC has so far provided students with the exposure to the organisation's operations. Engaging in mock court cases, interacting with industry experts, and preparing presentations on innovative tax concepts. It has been a great learning experience.

Diversity and Community Magistrates (DCRM) Workshop:

The acknowledgment of the impactful work at the Diversity and Community Magistrates workshop emphasised the commendable job undertaken by the school. The message conveyed appreciation for the schools efforts in changing the lives of vulnerable youngsters, preventing them from falling into the Criminal Justice System. The statement reflected deep appreciation for the transformative work being carried out.

further education. We ensure that all students are prepared and eager to take the next step in their academic journey. The next step is to make sure they attend their meeting and enrol in August.

Artificial Intelligence (AI) at Stone Soup Academy

Al-powered chatbots can provide instant feedback and support to students, while Al-powered tutoring systems can provide personalised instruction and feedback.


Al-powered counselling systems can provide students with mental health support and resources.

Both groups are working well to complete their assessment and achieve passes and hopefully be able to gain their certificates when finishing the courses.






Virtual Reality in SEND

Our SEND team has had the benefit of our own Quest VR to use since December in a wide range of intervention work with our students. The VR contains a number of games that aim to build on skills such as self regulation methods when a student becomes overwhelmed, the concentration lengths a student can manage when fully engaged. We also have a different perspectives game allowing students to look at the same situation from three different perspectives. This works on our students' understanding of others and empathy levels.

All students who have been participating in these interventions have made massive progress in their personal skills.









Literacy Legends

We have continued to support the entire academy in getting our students to a functional reading age using a number of different literacy strategies across both KS3 and KS4. Our students have continued to engage with our literacy programme **Literacy Gold** which builds on reading skills such as text skimming for important information, spelling, phonics and fluency.

As part of our literacy interventions we also have been reviewing students' reading ages and checking the effectiveness of our intervention strategies, a number of our students have made huge progress having already made over a year's development since November. The students are: Amy, Ava, Lewis H, Lewis L, Mckenzie, and Jace.

As well as the Literacy Gold, we have continued to work with our Year 11's building on exam skills and confidence in answering these exam style questions. These students are given the choice of a collection of past paper questions to attempt with 1-2-1 support from a member of the SEND team. Within these interventions students have built upon their abilities to pick out key information from the questions, and also their confidence in understanding the structure of answering longer exam questions.

Following the success of implementing touch typing within our KS3 interventions, SEND have gained additional licences enabling our KS4 students access to the multi-sensory programme building on their skills in writing, and spelling. The students who do fully engage with touch typing can receive an additional qualification within touch typing.

Touch Typing Key Quest

This half term we have introduced students to the Touch Typing programme. Touch typing is a typing technique where you rely on muscle memory and technique to type without looking at the keyboard, this can increase typing speed and accuracy.

This intervention can be particularly beneficial for those with Special Educational Needs (SEN) in several ways:

Accessibility: Touch typing can provide additional methods of communication for those with motor coordination difficulties and can offer an alternative to handwritten work.

Reducing cognitive load: Once the technique is mastered students can focus on their thoughts rather than typing, this can be beneficial for those with attention-related challenges

Enhancing focus: Touch typing encourages children to maintain concentration and focus as they type without looking at the keyboard.

Students that have shown incredible typing accuracy this half term are: Cian W, Zdenek, Rocko, Taylor T, Asia and Megan T.





Beauty

This term in beauty we will continue to work towards BTEC level 1 Hair and beauty, students have identified which units suit their progression plans to enable them to use this qualification to their advantage in the future. This term we have concentrated on progression and career goals and implemented that into the cover letters and applications for employment/college Further plans for the rest of the academic year will consist of practical assessments and scheduling treatments appropriately to enable students to manage time effectively and deliver first class customer care. We have also run some enrichment sessions for KS3 which have been well received.






Stone Soup Flies to Barcelona
